Alina M. Alonso, MD

Director, Florida Department of Health – Palm Beach County

Alina Alonso, MD is the Director of the Florida Department of Health – Palm Beach County. Dr. Alonso is a Family Practice Physician and a Preventive Medicine/Public Health servant to the residents of Palm Beach County since 1989. As Director, she oversees the operations of one of the largest and nationally recognized local county health department serving a population of approximately 1,372,000. Her leadership of the professional staff provides a full range of primary and preventive services through seven strategically placed health centers, Environmental Public Health, WIC, Nutrition, School Health, Epidemiology, Preparedness and Community Health.

Dr. Alonso has trained in Bio-Chemical Terrorism and Weapons of Mass Destruction since 1997, and handled the clinical operations of the first case of inhalation Anthrax in the United States that occurred in 2001. She has extensive training in communicable and emergent diseases.

Dr. Alonso graduated from Barry University in 1978 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Biology, and a double Minor in Chemistry and Mathematics. She received her Medical Degree in 1984 from Universidad Autonoma de Ciudad Juarez in Mexico where she gained tremendous clinical skills treating the patient by discussing their medical history as an important component of diagnosis and not test results. Dr. Alonso served as Chief Resident in the three-year Family Practice Residency Program at St. Joseph Medical Center in New York City from 1985 to 1988. After returning home to Palm Beach County, she became a Clinical Physician with the Florida Department of Health - Palm Beach County Health Department and finished a second residency in Public Health and Preventive Medicine in 1992. She is a diplomate of the American Board of Family Practice and a member of the Palm Beach County Medical Society.

Dr. Alonso serves on multiple university faculties including Florida Atlantic University, the University of Miami and on the Advisory Board of Kieser University. Dr. Alonso's leadership is demonstrated further by her participation on numerous Boards locally on the Health Care District, Palm Healthcare, the Early Learning Coalition and the Community Alliance, and at the State level on the Florida Institute for Health Innovation as Chairperson.

In addition to her Public Health responsibilities, Dr. Alonso combines her Cuban heritage and her experience and training in Central America to stay active in minority health issues, patients' rights advocacy, cultural diversity and tolerance training. She holds the Leadership Award from the Executive Women of the Palm Beaches for the Public Sector and the Shining Star Healthcare Award from the Puerto Rican/Hispanic Chamber of Commerce.

Wendy Satin Rapaport, PsyD, LCSW

Clinical Psychologist, Adjunct Professor of Medicine, Diabetes Research Institute at the University of Miami

Dr. Wendy Satin Rapaport has been on the faculty for 30 years at the University of Miami Medical School, Diabetes Research Institute, working as a psychologist with a medical team specializing in the treatment of patients with diabetes and their families. Dr. Rapaport's doctoral dissertation was "Humor as a Coping Mechanism in Diabetes Management." She has done research, written a book -"When Diabetes Hits Home: The Whole Family's Guide to Emotional Health", chapters and articles for professional publications, and speaks throughout the country on the psychological aspects of illness.

Dr. Rapaport also served on the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Diabetes Advisory Board. For the past 17 years, Dr. Rapaport has been in private practice, specializing in diabetes management, as well as a professor at the University of Maine Graduate School of Social Work. Anutosh Chakraborty, PhD

Assistant Professor, Department of Molecular Medicine, The Scripps Research Institute, Scripps Florida

Dr. Anutosh Chakraborty is an Assistant Professor of Metabolism and Aging at The Scripps Research Institute, Scripps Florida. He joined the department in 2012. Dr. Chakraborty received his PhD from The Jadavpur University, Kolkata, India and pursued his postdoctoral research in the Department of Neuroscience at The Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, Baltimore.

Dr. Chakraborty's laboratory focuses on identifying novel proteins that can be pharmacologically targeted in obesity, diabetes, and other metabolic diseases. In the US, 34.9% of the adults are obese of which 9.3% also have diabetes.

As a postdoctoral fellow, Dr. Chakraborty discovered a protein that promotes obesity and diabetes. Inositol hexakisphosphate kinase-1 is an enzyme which generates a biomolecule called inositol pyrophosphate or IP7. IP6K1 promotes energy accumulation which causes weight gain and diabetes. Therefore, mice lacking IP6K1 are protected against obesity, diabetes and fatty liver. Currently they are working on developing drugs which may ameliorate these diseases by inhibiting IP6K1.

Mr. Fuerst began teaching at several Palm Beach County universities as an adjunct professor of Accounting and Mathematics. In 2007, he became a full-time professor in the subject areas of Statistics, Economics, Accounting, Finance and Mathematics at Keiser University, West Palm Beach campus.

Associate Scientific Director of Discovery Biology, Translation Research Institute and Associate Professor in the Department of Molecular Medicine, The Scripps Research Institute, Scripps Florida

Associate Professor, Department of Molecular Medicine Patricia McDonald received her PhD in molecular genetics from Dundee University, in 1993. She is currently the Associate Scientific Director of Discovery Biology, Translational Research Institute, Scripps Florida, and holds a joint appointment as Associate Professor in the Department of Molecular Medicine at The Scripps Research Institute. Before joining Scripps in 2005, she spent 5 years in the Pharmaceutical Industry as a Research Biochemist at Dupont Pharma followed by Eli Lilly & Co.

Work in Dr. McDonald's laboratory is focused on the basic mechanisms regulating G protein-coupled receptor (GPCR) function and signaling. In addition, she leads multiple GPCR drug discovery projects with an emphasis on development of biochemical and cell-based functional assays to monitor GPCR activity using both high throughput and high content technologies. In collaboration with other disciplines such as chemistry, DMPK and in vivo pharmacology her laboratory aims to identify and develop small molecule and biologic modulators of GPCRs for the therapeutic treatment of metabolic and CNS disorders. John Wyrick, Service Dog Trainer


Scent Imprint for Dogs, K-9 and Service Dog (Diabetes Alert Dogs) Training Center
